- What is your image of a leader?
- What leads you to that image?
- How have and/or can you be a leader in to those in your life?
- If you accepted that you are a leader as described in this chapter and acted on that responsibility, what differences could that make in your communities (home, work, civic, and recreation)?
- What first step will you take to be a faithful leader in your communities?

- How would you define Servant Leader?
- Why is Servant Leadership a true form of leadership?
- How can you be a servant leader at home? At work?
- What would your home and/or work be like if you lived as a servant leader there?
- What first step can you take toward being or being a better servant leader?

Chapter Five: S¹: Beginning With the Heart

- What aspects of EGO, in both meanings presented in the book, impressed you?
- Why is the heart so important to servant leadership?
- What do you need to do to develop a servant's heart?
